

Learning objectives for the Neuraminidase/BLAST activity.

Summary:

Students will use a case study about a group of 32 fictitious patients with flu-like symptoms. Students will learn to navigate BLAST (Basic Local Alignment Search Tool), a tool from the National Center for Biotechnology Information (NCBI) website. They will explore the DNA and protein databases to compare and analyze Influenza neuraminidase DNA and protein sequences to determine how closely related the current flu strain (2017) is to past flu strains.

Learning Objectives:

Students will know that:

- Databases such as BLAST (Basic Local Alignment Search Tool) can be used to compare DNA or protein sequences, either by comparing two or more sequences to each other or by comparing a sequence to the database.
- The Neuraminidase protein may differ from strain to strain of influenza virus due to mutation of the viral genome.

Students will be able to:

- Navigate BLAST to compare DNA sequences to a reference sequence.
- Navigate BLAST to compare protein sequences to a reference sequence.

DCI's

LS1.A: Structure and Function

All cells contain genetic information in the form of DNA molecules. Genes are regions in the DNA that contain the instructions that code for the formation of proteins, which carry out most of the work of cells.

LS3.A Inheritance of Traits

Each chromosome consists of a single very long DNA molecule, and each gene on the chromosome is a particular segment of that DNA. The instructions for forming species' characteristics are carried in DNA. All cells in an organism have the same genetic content, but the genes used (expressed) by the cell may be regulated in different ways. Not all DNA codes for a protein; some segments of DNA are involved in regulatory or structural functions, and some have no as-yet known function. (HS-LS3-1)
